Saint Patrick's Day

History

St. Patrick's Day celebrates the life of Saint Patrick—the patron saint of Ireland. This influential missionary has been credited with bringing Christianity to Ireland. St. Patrick's Day takes place on March 17 each year because St. Patrick's death is believed to have been on March 17, 461. The Church began observing a special feast to honor him on this day starting in 1631.

Saint Patrick's Breastplate

"Saint Patrick's Breastplate" is an Old Irish prayer of protection. It is supposed to have been composed by him in preparation for his victory over paganism.

The first five sections of the prayer or hymn begin *atomruig indiu* "I bind unto myself today", followed by a list of sources of strength that the prayer calls on for support.

The first three sections of text are as follows:

I bind to myself to-day, The strong power of the invocation of the Trinity: The faith of the Trinity in the Unity The Creator of the elements.

I bind to myself to-day, The power of the Incarnation of Christ, with that of his Baptism, The power of the Crucifixion with that of his Burial, The power of the Resurrection, with the Ascension, The power of the coming of the Sentence of Judgement.

I bind to myself to-day,
The power of the love of Seraphim,
In the obedience of Angels,
(In the service of Archangels,)
In the hope of Resurrection unto reward,
In the prayers of the noble Fathers,
In the predictions of the Prophets,
In the preaching of Apostles,
In the faith of Confessors,
In purity of Holy Virgins,
In the acts of Righteous Men.

Clerk's Report

On February 12th the Session met in a special Called meeting with Rev. Tracy Keenan, New Castle Presbytery's Missional Presbyter and a Advisor to the Presbytery's Ignite Committee. She came to review and discuss the denominational Vital Congregations Initiative. The Session decided to review the program further and to discuss it again at the upcoming Stated meeting on February 19th. At that meeting it was decided to send Barbara Montazella and Beverly Cook to the Presbytery retreat in Cambridge, MD (March 3-4) to learn more details and to see how New Covenant could implement it. Carol will be attending as well.

The Session's regular Stated meeting was held on February 19th. Trustees Al Grimminger and Bill Shields attended the meeting to present the Trustee's recommendation that we approve the request of the Transformational Congregation (a small Hindi language, Christian congregation) to use our sanctuary for their services on Saturday evenings. There are still more details to confirm and a contact committee to set up but the Session agreed to accept a 6 month trial if the final details are satisfactory to the Trustees. We are still working out details of this arrangement.

The Session approved the 2023 schedule for communion which will be held on Christmas Eve, Maundy Thursday and the first Sunday of each month with the exception of April, as that Sunday is Palm Sunday and communion will be held on Maundy Thursday.

We are always open to any questions you may have and our meetings are open to all.

Shepherds Caring for the NCPC Flock

CARING FOR ONE ANOTHER

In case you haven't noticed, the members and friends at NCPC do a pretty good job of caring for each other. We are like a family and we love and care for each other. In a sense, we are playing the role of God for our friends when they are hurting or in need. This is the primary role of our deacons and one of the most important ones of our pastor. But we must all work together to make our community of faith one of love, support and encouragement.

When we try to be faithful to be good friends and neighbors to and for each other, it may appear that God has been left out, but that is not the case. You see, God is **NOT PART** of the process of caring. God **IS THE PROCESS**. It is the Spirit of God that leads us to be the loving, caring people God created us to be.

The God we worship is the God of the whole person - thoughts, emotions, and actions. Therefore God works at every level of human personality because he is the God of everything. Even if a friend is able to get in touch with his or her own thoughts, feelings and actions and knows what to do to solve a problem, from where does the power come to solve the problem? It comes from God.

We believe that the best way to show Christ's love to a hurting friend is simply to be there. Martin Marty suggests that the real meaning of the hymn, *What a Friend We Have in Jesus* is "What a Jesus We Have in a Friend." By being a friend, a sister or brother in faith, trying to care for one another, we are the Body of Christ, through the Spirit, to a friend in need.

When we attempt to provide the love and care a sister or brother needs, we develop relationships which can go much deeper than a friendship. We become like family. And for those who us who have no blood family nearby, I can't tell you just how much that means to us. It's like we become earthen vessels of God, pouring out the love of God to each other. And as we care for one another, we find ourselves growing closer to God. That's the paradox of faith: The more you give away of God's love, the more you receive.

Love and care can be needed and expressed in many ways. Our pastor, deacons and elders try to stay in touch with all the NCPC Flock, so that we might know what each one's needs may be. It may be a listening ear, or a ride to an appointment, a meal when sick, or a visit to the hospital. Whatever is needed, we try provide in the name of Christ.

So, how do we do that? We have 6 groups of Sheep (meaning you) with 2 Shepherds appointed to be your Shepherd. Each group has an Elder paired with a Deacon to do their best to care for the whole flock of folks who are a part of our ministry. On the next page, you will see who is in each group of "flock" and who is assigned to be your "shepherd." Help your shepherd care for you and we all will be stronger as a result. May 2023 be a year full of love and caring!


JUMPING INTO 2023


