Dear friends,

Well, we're in the thick of summer and you just can't think of this season without thinking of baseball. I haven't attended a game this summer, but I imagine that many of you have. I read an article about what constitutes a "perfect" baseball game, and I thought you might be interested in what it says and how it relates to our life as Christians.

Do you know what makes for a "perfect" baseball game? It takes no hits, no walks, no hit batsmen, and no errors. Amazingly it has only happened about 25 times in the history of major league baseball but it happened twice in May of 2010 when Dallas Braden of the Oakland A's and Rob Halladay of the Philadelphia Phillies each pitched a perfect game. And it almost happened a third time in June of that year when pitcher Armando Galarraga of the Detroit Tigers had only one more out to achieve.

What happened? The batter for the Cleveland Indians



came to the plate. Galarraga's first pitch – strike; next pitch – a fall; third pitch – a groundball to the first baseman. Galarraga left the pitcher's mound to cover first. His teammate threw him the ball and he caught it, stepping on the base and turning to celebrate. In his mind, he had achieved his ultimate goal – a PERFECT game! Unfortunately, the umpire, Jim Joyce, called the batter safe even though replay after replay showed the runner was out. It

was a bad call but it held and Galarraga's perfect game became a one-hitter, his goal being shattered.

Can you imagine how Armando Galarraga felt? It simply wasn't fair. He deserved the honor he had earned but it didn't come. Why? It was because of a mistake on someone else's part. Can you imagine Armando's anger of the feeling of disappointment and frustration that must have welled up inside of him? And what about Jim Joyce, the umpire? He must have had a pretty heavy dose of guilt land on him. And yet, what happened next is why I share this story with you.

Jim Joyce went to the locker room to apologize to Galarraga. And, the young pitcher responded with class, accepting the apology with grace. So, what does this have to do with how we are called to live the Christian life? Is there something we can learn from this encounter? Did Armando achieve "almost perfection" himself? Of course not! It took all nine players of the Tigers each racking up and out, each of them using their particular gifts to create this "almost perfect" game.

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We've heard the scripture from Paul many times, "But to each of us was given grace according to the measure of Christ's gift...The gifts he gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers." We could add – "some pitchers, some outfielders, some needleworkers, some ushers, some sound technicians, some greeters, some people who handle building repairs, some officers, some who beautify the church through painting, and some who shepherd others..."

Unfortunately, even though we know in our heads that it takes a village to raise a child and that it takes all of us within the church to faithfully seek and answer God's call to ministry, our thoughts don't always translate into action. Many of us insert ear plugs because we don't want to hear what God is asking of us; we only want to hear God's call to others who certainly must be better qualified or have more time and talent that we do.

This happens for a variety of reasons. We're too tired, too busy, have too many other responsibilities. We truly don't believe ourselves to be able or worthy, etc., etc. Or, when we do accept a leadership position, we see no need for others to get involved or to share their gifts. It's just easier to do it ourselves and, besides, we have all the gifts that are needed to do the job. And the result is that we wear ourselves out trying to be the "whole" body rather than just one part. Perhaps we never considered that by doing it all ourselves we were denying someone else the opportunity to be blessed by using their God-given gifts. Some people won't ever volunteer but they would gladly help out if asked to do so.

Is this God's plan for the BODY OF CHRIST? I don't think so and yet it keeps happening. And we wonder why so many officers are burned out at the end of their terms and we have a hard time getting enough people to serve the following year. When are we going to learn to do things according to God's plan rather than our own?

Did Ron Halladay or Dallas Braden Armando Galarraga (almost) achieve their "perfect game" by themselves? Did they say to themselves "In order to pitch a perfect game, I need to strike out every batter." And if someone hits the ball, I must field it all by myself and get the batter out. No need for teammates. I can do it all by myself!"

This is a crazy idea for a baseball field and an even crazier one for the church. God calls particular individuals to leadership in the church according to their gifts. But God doesn't call them to do it all by themselves. If we keep reading Paul's words we find that leaders are to "equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ."

My friends, God is the One who has provided each of us with our gifts and talents and we are called to use them to serve God and the church. God has gifted people within our congregation to serve as elders, deacons, teachers, etc. so that TOGETHER we might build up the body of Christ and draw others to the One True God. We've each got to recognize our gifts and WILLING-LY share them (not begrudgingly or ignoring them, resolutely closing our ears). No one of us can do it alone and when we join together as the body, as God's team at NCPC, trusting each other and supporting and encouraging one another, then nothing is impossible to achieve.

God has provided all that is needed, especially the grace that we need to serve and give of ourselves with the right attitude. No, we will never attain perfection but we are called to strive for it, becoming more like Christ each and every day. So, join your teammates and trust in God and one another that we might be surprised what talents appear before us that will bless this congregation. When we do these things God will bless us with a bright future, but not without commitments and hard work.


FORT DELAWARE EXCURSION

Worship & Outreach

What is "Ordinary Time" in the Church Calendar?

New Covenant follows a Common Lectionary which provides specific scripture readings for each Sunday and festival in a three-year cycle. These texts were selected by an ecumenical group of scholars (The Consultation on Common Texts-CCT), and provide for a disciplined use of the whole range of scripture in the church's worship. It also creates a greater sense of connectionalism to the greater Church. On any given Sunday, churches which observe this common lectionary hear the same scriptures read and proclaimed in many parts of the world and in many different denominations.

The use of the term "ordinary" in this manner means that which is standard, normative or typical. In our observance of the Christian Year (Liturgical Year), Ordinary Time includes two distinct segments which together comprise the majority of the Christian Year: the time between Epiphany (Jan. 6th) and Lent (from four to nine weeks), and the time between Pentecost and Advent (23 to 28 weeks following Pentecost). Both of these segments are calculated from the variable date of Easter.

Week after week, Sunday ordinarily celebrates the resurrection and the unfolding of the new creation. The standard for worship is, therefore, the ordinary time of Sunday in the week-to-week progression of time. Ordinary Time presents us with an ongoing opportunity to witness to the living Lord who makes all things new.

Twice each year Ordinary Time is heightened by the **extra-ordinary** time of the Advent/ Christmas and Lent/Easter cycles. They are **extra-ordinary** in that they intensify the foundational doctrines of incarnation and resurrection. The liturgical contribution of these cycles is to supplement the "ordinaries" of worship with additional or seasonally reflective elements.

Each liturgical season is designated by a particular color to be used on the church's paraments (cloth draped over the pulpit and communion table). We hope this explanation of our church's seasons will help you better understand how our church seeks to follow and serve our Lord Jesus Christ.



Clerk's Report

We did, however, have an email discussion and vote regarding the recommendation from the Trustees to have our Treasurer set up a designated fund to receive and disburse money to purchase food to be used at Our Daily Bread. We also had a Congregational Meeting on 7/9 to elect Bob Megonigal as a trustee, Class of 2023.

We do continue with our monthly meeting with our Vital Congregations facilitator, Nate Phillips. In July we met on the 9th and our topic was considering where we stand financially. We took an honest look at our meager funds, realizing that we can not continue spending more than we take in. But, we were very thankful that our Year-to-Date figures were better than expected. Our Income through June of this year is \$61,257.18 and our Expenses have been \$62,275.62, thus giving us a deficit of \$1,018.44. It has been much worse in the past, so we give thanks that the deficit was less than it could have been. Many thanks to all who are contributing when possible.

We are pleased to let you know that the Lees, who have begun forming the Korean Church in Middletown, have been meeting early on Saturday mornings for prayer and for worship/fellowship following our service on Sundays.



Typically, in the summer months, our regular classes take a break. But this summer we were approached with a new opportunity:



NCPC STEWARDSHIP

Titled and Entitled

"The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it." Ps. 24:1

The first car I ever owned was a 1978 Chevrolet Monza station wagon. I was in graduate school and I struggled to make my \$67 a month payment but it served me well. Finally, after several years, I obtained my "title" indicating that the car was officially MINE. Among the many things people own, only a few - cars, houses, real estate - are so valuable that the owner keeps a piece of paper called a "title" to prove that (s)he is the true owner. And a title holder is "entitled" to do whatever (s)he or (s)he wants with the things (s)he owns.

Each month, we will explore a different aspect of STEWARDSHIP, but we must begin by thinking about OWNERSHIP. To "own" something is to have the right to decide how it is to be used, how it might be altered, and, ultimately, what its fate will be. A STEWARD, on the other hand, works on the owner's behalf to protect and enhance what belongs to the owner. The owner decides the responsibilities and duties of a steward.

Scripture has a straightforward answer to the basic question of ownership - EVERYTHING BELONGS TO GOD. As Psalm 24 states, "The earth is the Lord's." This phrase, or a variation of it, occurs so often that we might call it the basic creed of the Old Testament. And to leave no doubt as to what is included in this ownership, a verse is added, "and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it." And when the Bible says EVERYTHING, it means everything. God is Creator of all things, visible and invisible. There is nothing and no one - no thing or person - that is not God's.

The effects of this scriptural premise are far-reaching and dramatic. We may "own" something and believe that we are entitled to do with it as WE please, but the claim of Psalm 24 is so far-reaching that such statements are simply not possible for a disciple of Jesus Christ. My house? NO, God's house, so I will do with it as God pleases. My car? NO, God's car, so I will do with it as God pleases.

To truly understand what this means, we must start with the HUMILITY OF PLACE. To be human is a grand thing, but it is not the ultimate thing. Only God is the Source and Creator of all there is. Psalm 100 reminds us, "Know that the Lord is God. It is God who made us, and we are God's." God's title to ALL things originates in God's creation of all things.

To profess Jesus Christ and acknowledge God is to forgo any claim we might want to make to absolute ownership over anything. God may entrust us with the care of the earth, of things necessary for life, of family, of ideas and stories and history and even life itself. But NEVER can we claim that these things are



ours to do with as we please. They ALL BELONG TO GOD. Even a 1978 Chevrolet Monza station wagon that I worked and sweated for so diligently. In truth, it was NEVER really mine.
