Dear friends,

You have heard several of us say that our congregation is fully participating in Vital Congregations Initiative designed by our denomination and offered by our presbytery. Even some of us on the Session aren't completely sure what it is all about but I feel the need to keep the congregation informed as much as possible.

So, my article this month is about the Vision Statement for Vital Congregations. Here are 4 of the most basic questions:

Question 1: What is this initiative?

Answer: It hopes to be the beginning of intentional, authentic relationships between the PCUSA Mission Agency and mid council leaders and pastors to:

- Come together as the people of God
- Pray: Re-turn to faithfulness in God
- Inspire openness to the Holy Spirit's transformation/ change
 - Honestly assess, discern and act
 - Resource, equip and support leaders and pastors
- Practice missional evangelism and faithful discipleship
- Equip vital congregations and develop a praxis of sustainability and ongoing assessment
- Capture congregational stories and develop new measurements of vitality

Question 2: What it is **NOT**:

Answer: It is not:

- A universal program instructing churches and assuring vitality and sustainable life
 - Another plan that promises an immediate fix

- Intentional pursuits of reconciliation
- Hopefulness in change

COMMUNION-THE LORD'S SUPPER-HOW DO WE RECEIVE IT?



Last month, we let you know about our new method of receiving the Sacrament of Communion. Our current method of distributing the sacramental elements is *INTINCTION*.

Each person is invited to come forward to receive a piece of bread and dip it in the juice. Both the pastor and lay leader will ensure safety by sanitizing their hands prior to distribution.

Of course, since this is a new procedure, it will involve some direction so that we can all process and recess in an orderly fashion, but there is no doubt that it can be done. Please be patient with us as we all adjust. This new method will allow ALL of us to receive the elements as we actively participate in receiving it from God.


I do not give to you as the world gives.



Regular Christian Education Classes On a Summer Break BUT

Mission Report

Our Daily Bread: We served 122 meals on First Friday, June 2nd.

The cost of providing 120 -130 meals each month to this very important mission in our community has become more than can be handled by "in kind" donations only and so the Session presents the congregation with a request (and opportunity), to assist the mission team with some financial support.



New Covenant provides 1 meal on the first Friday of each month. The cost of the meal, which consists of a grilled ham and cheese sandwich, pasta salad (in the summer) or soup (in the late fall and winter) and a small bag of potato chips or raw vegetables, is about \$130-150 each month. We do not have these funds available in the regular budget and so I asked the Session for some guidance. We decided to have a special collection each month, on Communion Sunday, for the Our Daily Bread/First Friday meal mission. This request was approved at the June Session meeting.

We will have a BREADBOX located at the back of the sanctuary for this special collection. Thank you for whatever you are able to give.

Neighborhood House: We continue our regular donations of non perishable food

NEIGHBORHOOD HOUSE • items to the community organization that services the Middletown-Odessa-Townsend area.

Friends, we may be small but we are mighty. In the first 6 months of 2023 (January-June) our congregation has contributed the following items to Neighborhood House:

26 grocery bags of non-perishable canned and packaged goods, 24 packages of Hot Dogs, 1 Case of Ramen Noodles, 1 large ziploc bag of individual toiletry items (toothbrush, toothpaste, soap, creams, shavers, shaving cream etc.) You, the congregation, continue to share your blessings with the community and remind us all of what being a

HOW CAN OUR CONGREGATION BE HEALTHY = BY DEVELOPING GENEROUS PEOPLE


GOD DOESN'T WANT US TO JUST FEEL GRATITUDE, BUT FOR US TO SHOW IT BY GIVING THANKS TO GOD WITH OUR LIVES.

What are the marks of a healthy congregation? According to the experts, healthy congregations:

- Focus on mission, challenge, and strengths
- Have leaders who are mature and motivated, and who accept the role of being stewards of the congregation
- Are well-prepared to manage tension and trauma; while they do not escape conflicts, they do NOT allow conflict to fester due to indecision or unresolved issues
 - Are characterized by a mood and spirit that is uplifting
- Intentionally practice clarity; for example, roles and expectations are clearly defined and widely understood.

GENEROUS PEOPLE

One of the most surprising discoveries made about healthy congregations is that they develop generous people. Perhaps this should not be a big surprise. Health, including physical health, is connected with generosity. The word "misery" comes from the word "miser." To hold on to everything you have is to invite unhappiness, loneliness, and anxiety. The only one you can trust and the only one who counts is YOU. But heart surgeon, James Lynch, writes that COMPANIONSHIP is the best form of life insurance. Hans Selye, the pioneer researcher into stress, notes that GRATITUDE enhances the immune system. *Giving thanks is life affirming.*



What promotes generosity? Healthy congregations are centered in God's grace. Grace is something you can never get but only be given. When received in gratitude, grace shapes one's acts of giving. A thankful heart is expressive. Giving becomes not an obligation, but an opportunity, a readiness, or a flow of gratefulness. "Freely you have received, freely give" (Mt. 10:8). The spirit of giving is gladness. Humans are an incredibly giving species. Donation is rare in species other than our own. We know that to live is to be given to and to give. Gladness springs both in our offering and in our receiving. May God lead us to become **GENEROUS IN OUR GIVING!**
